dumb (dʌm), 1. not able to speak; as, dumb animals. 2. silenced for the moment by fear, surprise, shyness, etc. 3. that does not speak; silent. 4. stupid; dull. *Informal. adj.* 3.

fool (fʊl), 1. person without sense; unwise or silly person. 2. clown formerly kept by a king or lord to amuse people; jester. 3. act like a fool for fun; play; joke. 4. make a fool of; deceive; trick. 5. person who has been deceived or tricked; dupe. 1,2,5 *n.*, 3,4 *v.* 2.

fools cap (fʊlz/'kɑp/), 1. writing paper in sheets from 12 to 13½ inches wide and 15 to 17 inches long. 2. fool's cap. *n.* 20.

fool's cap, cap or hood worn by the fool or jester of a king or lord. It usually had bells on it.

fool's errand, foolish or useless undertaking.

fool's gold, mineral that looks like gold; iron pyrites or copper pyrites.

fool's paradise, condition of happiness based on false beliefs or hopes.

idiot (id/'iət), 1. person so stupid that he can never learn to read or count; born fool. 2. very stupid or foolish person. *n.* 5.

idiotic (id/'iə'tik), of or like an idiot; very stupid or foolish. *adj.* 19.

incoherent (in/'kə'hɪr'ənt), 1. not sticking together. 2. disconnected; confused. *adj.* 17.

insanity (in'san/'iti), 1. state of being insane; madness; mental disease. 2. extreme folly. *n.*, *pl.* -ties. 11.

madness (mæd/'nis), 1. being crazy; loss of one's mind. 2. great rage; fury. 3. folly. *n.* 4.

reckless (rek/'lis), rash; heedless; careless. Reckless of consequences, the boy played truant. Reckless driving causes many automobile accidents. *adj.* 8.

stupid (stū/'pid or stū/'pid), 1. dull; not intelligent. 2. not interesting. 3. dazed; senseless. 4. a stupid person. 1,2,3 *adj.*, 4 *n.* 4.

stupidity (stūpid/'iti or stūpid/'iti), 1. dullness; lack of intelligence. 2. a foolish act, idea, etc. *n.*, *pl.* -ties. 12.

stupidly (stūpidli or stū/'pidli), 1. in a stupid manner. 2. to an extent or degree that is stupid.

clever (klev/'ər), 1. having a quick mind; bright; intelligent. 2. skillful or expert in doing some particular thing. 3. showing skill or intelligence; as, a clever trick, a clever answer.

brilliant (bril/'yʌnt), 1. sparkling; shining brightly. 2. splendid; magnificent. 3. having great ability. 4. diamond or other gem cut to sparkle brightly. 5. the smallest size of type; 3 point. *The line is set in brilliant.* 1,2,3 *adj.*, 4,5 *n.* 4.

brain (brān), 1. mass of nerve tissue enclosed in the skull or head of vertebrate animals. The brain is used in feeling and thinking. 2. part of the nervous system of invertebrates, corresponding to the brain of vertebrates. 3. dash the brains out of. 1,2 *n.*, 3 *v.* 3.

genius (jēn/'yəs or jē/'niəs), 1. very great natural power of mind. 2. person having such power. Shakespeare was a genius. 3. great natural ability. A great actor has a genius for acting. 4. special character or spirit of a person, nation, age, language, etc. 5. guardian spirit of a person, place, institution, etc. 6. either of two spirits, one good and one evil, supposed to influence a person's fate. 7. person who powerfully influences another. 8. spirit; jinn. *n.*, *pl.* geniuses for 1-4,7, *genii* (jē/'ni) for 5,6,8. 4.

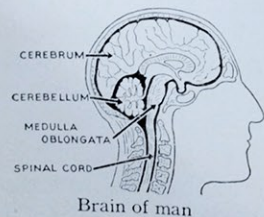

prodigy (prod/'ijɪ), 1. marvel; wonder. An infant prodigy is a child remarkably brilliant in some respect. 2. marvelous example. The warriors performed prodigies of valor. 3. wonderful sign or omen. *Archaic. n.*, *pl.* -gies. 11.

talent (tal/'ənt), 1. special natural ability; ability; as, a talent for music. 2. people who have talent. 3. ancient unit of weight or money. A talent of silver was worth about \$2000. *n.* 4.
